


Public safety and quality of life are two big priorities for the Third District office and our constituents. Recently, Supervisor Wagner brought forward a couple of items that passed unanimously at the Board of Supervisors. Read about them below.



In a forward-thinking proposal by Supervisor Wagner, the old County Hall of Administration building at 333 W. Santa Ana Blvd. won't go to waste before it's demolished to the ground. He directed the vacant, 5-story building be used for training grounds by Orange County Fire Authority, Orange County Sheriff's Department SWAT teams, and other county fire and law enforcement agencies for new training opportunities.

The building provided new ways to practice moving through doorways, hallways, and open spaces, from elevator rescues and repelling to manual breaching and active shooter drills. Each department thanks Supervisor Wagner for the ability to train in a new location; Supervisor Wagner thanks our first responders for partnering with the Third District office to improve public safety.

The new County Administration North building is located across the plaza at 400 W. Civic Center Drive in Santa Ana.

At the October 4 Board of Supervisors meeting, an item brought by Supervisor Wagner unanimously passed to help our homeless population get well and connected to services. \$250,000 from the Third District discretionary funds will purchase 25,000 food gift cards (\$10 each) distributed by the County's Outreach + Engagement team to people experiencing homelessness as an incentive to attend critical medical appointments with the County's Outreach + Engagement staff.

An additional \$50,000 will be allocated for the purchase of pet supplies for pet owners who are experiencing homelessness. The pilot program is aimed to further the rapport between our homeless population and the Outreach + Engagement team, who are there to help get individuals off the streets and into a more hopeful living situation.

ANOTHER VICTORY FOR OC VETERANS



The decade-long battle over where to build a local, dignified Orange County cemetery has an end in sight. Supervisor Wagner led the charge to focus on the most viable option -- the

County's 280-plus acre lot off Gypsum Canyon in Anaheim Hills.

On September 27, Assembly Bill 1595 was signed by the Governor for an OC Veterans cemetery. The County-sponsored bill allows the California Dept of Veterans Affairs to construct a state-owned and operated Southern California Veterans Cemetery at Gypsum Canyon in Anaheim Hills. Supervisor Wagner was honored to have led the bipartisan coalition with our Veterans and our community, including securing \$20 million of County funds to help prepare the entire site of the veterans' portion and start allowing burials. The cemetery's total capacity would be built out over many years. Building a 'heroes hill' will reflect OC's military history and a vision for the future: service, respect, and love of country. RAINBOW FENTANYL WARNING



The Drug Enforcement Administration is advising the public of an alarming emerging trend of colorful fentanyl available across the United States. Dubbed "rainbow fentanyl" in the media, this trend appears to be a new method used by drug cartels to sell to children and young people highly addictive and potentially deadly fentanyl made to look like candy.

One sugar packet's worth of fentanyl could harbor 500 lethal doses. More than 100,000 lives were consumed by drug poisonings and overdoses last year in the United States.

Supervisor Wagner brought forward a resolution at the County that implores the state to issue enhanced penalties for fentanyl dealers, in addition to adopting the "One Pill Can Kill" campaign to raise awareness. He got every city in his District to pass similar resolutions. With the Halloween season upon us, the old warning to never ingest unwrapped candy is more important than ever.

Illegal drugs are not only found on the streets. Social media platforms are another area where children can get access, as many schools these days are issuing required iPads and devices that could allow for more access. Supervisor Wagner brought the popular social app, Snapchat, to meet with the Sheriff's Department and other local law enforcement agencies to discuss ways to improve safety online.

Supervisor Wagner thanks the District Attorney and the Orange County Sheriff's Department for being partners in the commitment to fight fentanyl on all fronts and educate the community. The fight won't be easy in California – but with every life saved, it will be worth it.

LIGHT UP HOPE OC



The OC Board of Supervisors, with the OC Health Care Agency, launched the Light Up Hope OC campaign at the new County Administration North Building in Santa Ana to raise suicide awareness and prevention. 
